## The Institute for Economic Empowerment of Women September Newsletter

The summer heat this year has shown no mercy, but despite the rising temperatures and high humidity, our office has stayed cool, allowing us to work beyond the degrees in anticipation of not only the weather that fall will bring, but also the events we have planned!

Our first big endeavor since PEACE THROUGH BUSINESS has been preparing for and launching another pilot project in collaboration with Donors Trust, a 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to build a legacy of liberty.

We have already begun our nationwide listening tour, with four stops: Kansas City, Missouri, Anaheim, California, Little Rock, Arkansas, and New York City, New York.

We are gathering with women business owners in these states to have a discussion about what issues are impacting women entrepreneurs across the nation and what educational programs are needed to help women sustain their businesses.

Parinaz Hissami had nothing but high praises for her experience, especially mentorship week with Monica Smiley, Editor and Publisher of Enterprising Women in North Carolina.

"My experience with my mentor, she was very nice to me, like my mom," Parinaz wrote. "Somehow I feel I am at my home with my mom. I appreciate her character and attitude and all her kindness from deep of my heart."

Beyond becoming part of the family, Parinaz took away information from her mentorship experience and is putting ideas into action. After working with farmers in North Carolina, Parinaz has begun developing her plan of starting a farmer's market in Kabul. She envisions the market as a place where Afghan women farmers can bring their products to sell. Parinaz explains this is a totally new idea for Afghanistan, and she is busy working on her business plan as the first step.

We are proud of Parinaz for her dedication and efforts to seeking innovative solutions for women farmers in Afghanistan!
